Challenge 7: Digitalization of Public Procurement

Challenge 8: A modern legal, institutional and regulatory framework



The **new public procurement law** will amend provisions in other relevant laws.

Any law regulating the concerned institutions shall be **consistent with** the **principles, objectives and provisions** of the new procurement Law.



Ministry of Finance Action Plan: 3 Reform Tracks

New Public Procurement Draft Law based on 8 guiding principles, in line with the 12 OECD guiding principles

- Reviewing and upgrading the 5 Standard Bidding
 Documents for Goods, Works and Consultancy
 Services
- **Draft decree** to make their use mandatory.

Methodology for Assessing Procurement Systems (MAPS II); an international assessment tool:

- A clear and sound legal framework;
- Institutional mapping and distribution of roles and prerogatives;
- Preparing for e-procurement as key instrument to enhance transparency and accountability.
